Connection comes first - Restorative Practice at MHS



Morisset High School is the first school in Western Lake Macquarie to introduce Restorative Practices as the framework that underpins all teaching, learning, and behaviour and relationship management at our school.

This whole-school focus is centred around stronger relationships, not only in the ways our teachers and staff connect with our students, and the way students connect with each other, but also in how our school connects with families, and the community.

Using Restorative Practices in the classroom, in the yard, and to help manage when things don't go to plan, is a powerful way to build positive relationships, to resolve conflict, improve student behaviours, reduce negative relationships, encourage personal responsibility, and empower students to make things right when things go wrong.

How does Restorative Practice work?

Working restoratively is based on asking students the right questions when things go wrong.

To help resolve conflict or disagreement at school, traditionally teachers put their detective hats

on and focus on finding out what happened, or what was in the past.

Restorative Practice gives teachers, staff, students and families the tools they need to unpack conflict or disagreement focusing on the present impact and how this conflict can be resolved and ess impactful in the future. These are important interpersonal skills that students will take with them into their adult lives.

Put simply, in a situation of conflict or disagreement between students, our staff will ask your children questions like:

- What happened?
- How has that made people feel?
- What actions will you take to restore the relationship and make things better?

Our ongoing partnership with Real Schools provides our school community with resources and access to expertise and support to make the best use of the Restorative Practice tools to benefit all learners.

Diverse programs to unlock student potential

Meeting every child where they are on their learning journey and nurturing them to unlock their talents is the core purpose of teaching and learning at Morisset High School.

Our team of highly skilled and committed teachers, staff and executive achieve this by offering a diverse range of learning programs to support the learning needs of each student.



Tap into sporting strengths and talents

The Morisset High School Targeted Sports Program (TSP) was launched in 2023 to offer students access to training and coaching to grow their talents and potential in selected sports.

Morisset High School invests in specialist and professional standard training facilities, with our purpose-built Multipurpose Fitness and Elite Sports Training Centre and specialist staff trained in coaching and strength and conditioning training.

All TSP students will be mentored and supported to achieve their goals in their chosen sport, and in the classroom.

Students with an interest or talent in a range of sports would benefit in being part of the TSP program. Students interested in or talented in sports would benefit from being part of the TSP program.

Building learning confidence and capacity

Our Contemporary Learning Centre (*nu balalyiku-umilyaba*), set in our historic schoolhouse, is a great space for all Morisset High School students to develop their skills and confidence as learners.

Our Contemporary Learning Centre teachers and teaching support staff are specially trained to help unlock the unique learning strengths of each student and help them build their confidence as learners with targeted programs in literacy, numeracy and other key learning skills.



What is the Big Picture Learning Difference?

The Big Picture Academy is a program offered at Morisset High School that supports students in developing their personal passions and learning from real-world experiences to pave their way to success in their careers and the workforce after school. Morisset High School is the only school in Western Lake Macquarie to partner with Big Picture Australia to offer a Big Picture learning opportunity for students from the Morisset area and beyond.

Through the Big Picture Learning design, students develop skills to become confident, independent, self-directed learners. In the Big Picture Academy highly-trained Advisors facilitate learning in Advisories. A Big Picture Advisory includes peers from across the different stages of learning, which encourages collaboration and sharing of knowledge.

Students in Years 9-12 participate in internships that provide the opportunity for real-world experiences where students are mentored by professionals in their area of interest. By participating in Learning Through Internship (LTI) students develop the skills to transition from school into the workforce or further education such as university or TAFE. At the end of Year 12, Big Picture Academy students complete an international qualification that is recognised by more than 30 Australian Universities.



What are the Big Picture Qualities?

- Students who are curious about the world around them and want to learn about what interests them.
- Students who want to experience real world learning by working alongside experts in their field of interest.
- Students who want to drive their own learning, and achieve their goals, with support from their Advisor.

Many of our MHS Big Picture Academy graduates have gone on to university, to study different disciplines including IT, gaming, sports science, midwifery, and teaching. Some of these students have started their degrees before finishing Year 12.

Big Picture students can take part in courses alongside other MHS students to enhance their learning. Our Big Picture students learn in modern, flexible learning spaces that encourage students to develop as self-directed learners. Visit the Morisset High website for more information.

Places in the Morisset High School ACE program are limited. ACE students have access to specialist teaching support and do most of their learning from a homeroom, which helps to boost their engagement in learning and grow their confidence as learners.

Different skills & courses to suit student interests and passion

▼ Certificate III - Live Production (Entertainment)

This qualification empowers students with technical skills for work in the entertainment industry, live performance or events production.



Certificate II - Construction

Teaching high demand skills and technical knowledge suitable for employment and further training in the construction industry.



Teaching high-demand manufacturing, engineering installation, repair and maintenance skills that prepare students for manufacturing and engineering trades and careers.



Certificate III Assistant Dance

This course prepares students for careers including choreography and dance teaching.



Certificate III in Sports Coaching

Sports Coaching teaches students to practise healthy and active lives.



Certificate II - Hospitality, Food and Beverage

This qualification provides a pathway to work in various hospitality settings, such as restaurants, catering, pubs, and cafés. Students learn these high demand skills in our commercial kitchen and cafe.



Certificate III - Retail

Around 10 per cent of the national workforce is in retail. This qualification prepares students to work in various retail roles and community pharmacy.



Certificate II - Agriculture (Primary Industries)

There is high demand for skilled workers in agriculture and related industries. This qualification gives students hands-on experience at our Agriculture Centre and technical knowledge to work with animals and manage agricultural assets.



Certificate II - Business Services

This qualification prepares students for careers in a variety of business settings, including medical and office administration, receptionist and clerical roles.

An inclusive learning environment for all students





Malangba at Morisset High School aims to provide inclusive and quality education for students with additional learning needs from Years 7 to 12.

An individualised learning plan is created for each student to empower them to become active and valuable members of the community. Our specialised staff work with the students and families to identify their learning, work and career goals to create a program of academic learning, skills and vocational training so that each student is confident and prepared for their chosen path once they finish school.

Malangba classes also participate in many everyday living and community programs which include running a morning tea café, travel training utilising public transport and work experience programs that have led to past Malangba students gaining employment before they have left school. Our Malangba students are encouraged to be active members of our school community and can take part in year electives, whole school events and representative activities.

How we give feedback on learning and support your child's achievement

Morisset High School offers opportunities for students to learn and thrive, regardless of their abilities and their personal learning goals. We have high expectations of our students as learners and young people to contribute positively to their school and community.

Collaboration with students and families is at the heart of our teaching and learning, and school learning culture.



All Morisset High School students will be given clear guidance on the assessment and feedback process for each subject and will be supported to be empowered learners who seek feedback on their learning.

We want to have an open dialogue with our students and families about our high expectations for their young person's learning and the learning and personal attributes they show inside and outside the classroom, which research and experience tell us are closely linked to student success at school and in life beyond school.

Academic Reports

Academic reports are provided to families each semester online through the Morisset High School Parent Portal. If you have a question or would like to check in with your child's teachers on their progress, we encourage you to contact the school. Our teachers will also contact families to provide feedback, and to discuss the needs and learning of their students.

Check In Reports

Twice a term, our teachers provide families with insight into how each student is performing in class and showing the personal and learning attributes they need to reach their goals.



The Check In Reports also provide families with feedback on how students are meeting the school's learning and behaviour expectations.

The Check In Reports are provided online through the Morisset High School Parent Portal.

Every day matters

As student assessment is cumulative in all subjects, it is essential that, in class, students keep all aspects of their learning up to date and up to standard and that they regularly revise and practice their work at home as part of a consistent homework/study routine.

Year 10 and Year 12 - ROSA and HSC

We work closely with the National Education Standards Authority (NESA) to ensure our students meet the requirements to complete their Record of School Achievement (ROSA) in Year 10 and Higher School Certificate (HSC) in Year 12. Detailed information is made available to students and families.

Our HSC High Performance program provides individualised support for students in Stage 6 to ensure they have the support they need to succeed and be confident in achieving their goals after school.











Collaboration and Connection Learning, student voice and Itji-Marru Aboriginal Education and Resource Centre

Morisset High celebrates the culture and identity of all students and is committed to the learning, development, and aspiration of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students.

We collaborate with families and the community, to deliver cultural programs and integrate cultural knowledge into the learning of all Morisset High students. We also offer Aboriginal Studies in Years 9, 10, 11 and 12 and teach Awabakal language to all Year 8 students.

Our Aboriginal Resource Centre, Itji Marru, has been the heart of our school's learning community for more than 30 years. Itji-Marru is set to grow, with plans to build an outdoor culture and learning centre for use by the whole community.

Morisset High is proud to have a dedicated team of Elders and teachers guiding Aboriginal Education at MHS. Our long-serving Aboriginal Education Officer, Aunty Selena Archibald, and Aunty Cecilia Enoch, who also acts as our School Chaplain, are the anchors of Itji-Marru and support the learning and development of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students.



Deadly Awards

Each year we join other public schools in the Western Shores Learning Alliance and the community to celebrate culture and the success and learning aspirations of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students at the Deadly Awards. The event is organised in collaboration with the Itji-Marru Aboriginal Education Consultative Group and is open to the community.




Itji-Marru Aboriginal Education Consultative Group

We are a Proud Uniform Wearing School

Students, staff, parents and community representatives have endorsed the compulsory wearing of school uniforms by students of Morisset High School. All students are expected to wear the correct uniform and to be dressed neatly at all times.

Our student leadership groups and Parents and Citizens Association collaborated closely on the design of a new suite of uniforms introduced at Morisset High School in 2022. Our school polo design reflects our school's connection with our First Nation's culture, primary schools, and the greater community. Our new look school uniform is produced by the Newcastle-based uniform supplier BME Pty Ltd.

To make it easier for families, our students can wear our past school uniforms, with a transition period of three years. This means that our past school uniform - for example, the yellow polo for junior students, can be worn until the end of 2025.

When students feel supported, included and accepted, they thrive in their learning and personal development. Supporting our students to thrive is the focus of our multi-disciplinary Wellbeing Team.



2024 Year Advisers: An important link between students, families and School

Year Advisors are an important connection between students, families and our School and can provide support and advocacy for students to support their child's wellbeing and successful learning. They can assist with:

- Personal, family or social problems;
- Educational progress;
- Choice of subjects and courses of study;
- Concerns related to school uniform and general conduct; and
- Attendance, punctuality and absentee notes.

Attendance at School - Every Minute Matters

As part of our high expectations for learning and engagement by students at Morisset High School, we monitor attendance. Schools, in partnership with parents, are responsible for promoting the regular attendance of students.

Procedures for students in Years 7 to 12

Students in Years 7 to 12 are expected to arrive at school before 8.55 am on school days, in time for roll call.

Late Arrivals and Early Leavers

If a student is late to school or needs to leave school early, parents need to provide a signed note or contact the school to provide an explaination for the absence. Any unexplained absenes are recorded by the school and are monitored by the Department of Education.

Students who arrive late must wait in reception to be issued a late note to present to their classroom teacher.


Absence Explanations

When students are absent, a note from the parent or guardian must be presented to their roll call teacher on the day on which they return to school. The note must detail the dates and reason for the absence, be signed by the Parent/Guardian and include the student's full name, roll call class and Year.

Parents and carers will also be contacted via text message if their child is absent from school. To report the absence, parents and carers can reply to the text to explain the absence, email the school or use the absence notification function on the Morisset High School Parent Portal.

If a student will be absent for an extended (3 days or more) period, please notify the school immediately in writing or by email.







Getting to school - catching the bus, and train, walking, riding, drop-off and pick-ups

Walking and riding

Students are encouraged to use the pedestrian crossing on the corner of Newcastle and Bridge Streets and to access and exit the school from the gates adjacent to the Itji-Marru Aboriginal Resource Centre.

If students ride to school, they are encouraged to use the pedestrian crossing and access the school from the main gate, near the school administration building. Students are encouraged to dismount their bikes and push them to school along the footpath on Bridge Street. A bike rack is provided outside of the administration building in Quad 1. Families are reminded students are responsible for securing their bikes in this area.

Catch the school bus or public transport

Our students can apply for travel on school buses provided by Hunter Valley Buses or to catch public transport services. The Morisset Train Station, is less than a 10-minute walk to Morisset High School and public bus stops are located on Newcastle Street, outside the Morisset Square shopping centre, adjacent to the school.

Families can apply for Opal cards for free student transport on school buses and public transport. Negative behaviour can lead to a student losing access to the Student Opal card. Please be aware that bullying, anti-social or dangerous behaviour on school transport will not be tolerated.

Hours of operation may apply to some signs.

This means that the restrictions apply for those times only.

Pick ups and Drop-Offs

Parents and carers are advised to drop off or pick up students from Newcastle Street, or in the drop-off area, past the pedestrian crossing, near the corner of Bridge and Newcastle Streets.

A Bus Zone in Bridge Street runs along most of the front of Morisset High School. The MHS Bus Zones operate from 8.30 am to 9.30 am and 2.30 pm to 3.30 pm on school days.

Please note that fines apply for parking or dropping off and picking up students in Bus Zones.

Yondr Pouches - Student Use of Mobile Devices at School

The safety and engagement of our students are core business for Morisset High School and are the focus of the school's Mobile-Free School phone and communication devices policy.

In response to community feedback, and NSW Government policy, Morisset High School has implemented a mobile device-free learning environment. This means that mobile phones and mobile devices, including smartwatches and Bluetooth-enabled headphones and earbuds (for example, Air Pods), are not to be used by students during school hours.



Each student will be supplied a Yondr pouch, that will be secured during the school day and unlocked as students leave school. Processes will be in place and have been communicated to students, parents and carers. For more information visit the MHS website.

Be prepared: book requirements for students

Morisset High School supplies textbooks required for your child's course. Textbooks are issued on loan and must be cared for and returned on request.

Families are required to provide their child with exercise books, stationery and other materials needed to support their child's learning.

Starting Year 7 - what will you need?

For all Year 7 students who will start their learning journey at Morisset High School in 2023, we have prepared a book pack to assist students and families in making a smooth transition to high school. The pack is of good value and helps to reduce the cost for families.

The school subsidies the cost of the packs that contain all the equipment Year 7 students need to start high school. The book packs cost \$30 each and are available from the school office.

Scientific Calculators

Year 7 students will also need a scientific calculator. which can be purchased from the school office for \$33.
